There's room at God's table for all : World Communion Sunday



Bishop Joel N. Martinez experienced the call to ministry as a teenager. With the help of the Crusade Scholars program, he followed that call at Perkins School of Theology in Dallas. "The Crusade Scholars program made possible my seminary education," Martinez said. "This program is vital to our church's future."

The Crusade Scholarship program is funded through the special offering on **World Communion Sunday**, the first Sunday in October. Originally a Presbyterian observance, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ established World-wide Communion Sunday in 1940 as a global, interdenominational event. Prompted by the impact of World War II, the Methodist Church received an offering on this Sunday for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service. In 1971 the United Methodist Church changed the name to World Communion Sunday and redistributed the offering to support the Crusade Scholarship Program (begun in 1944), and the Ethnic Minority Scholarship Program.

Half of the offering provides Crusade Scholarships for international and U.S. racial- and ethnic-minority graduate students.

- Thirty-five percent supports Ethnic Scholarships for undergraduate students.
- Fifteen percent funds Ethnic In-Service Training Program scholarships for racial- and ethnic-minority persons seeking second careers in church-related vocations.

A former World Methodist Council member and World Council of Churches delegate, Martinez counts ecumenical involvement as one of the richest rewards of his ministry. He advises aspiring clergy "to serve in an ecumenical spirit, open to the tradition and wisdom of your sisters and brothers in the faith." --Adapted from an Interpreter article

Stress. Anxiety. Fear. These words capture the state of mind of many Americans. Within the greater economic system, there has been market loss, bankruptcies, and rising unemployment. Every day seems to bring another piece of economic uncertainty.

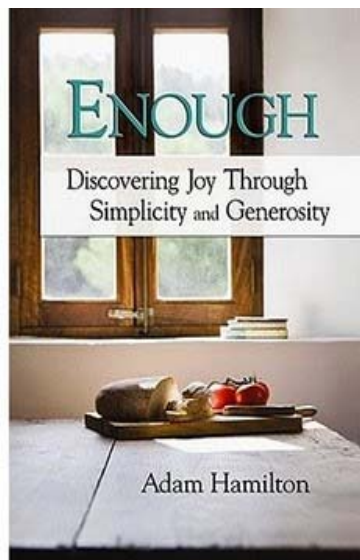
A recent survey found over three in four Americans to be stressed over personal finances. Half were worried about their family's basic needs. Over half of respondents reported feeling angry and irritable. The report concludes that, "The declining state of the nation's economy is taking a physical and emotional toll on people nationwide."¹

Join us in worship from October 9 through November 13 for a six-week sermon series entitled *Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity*. Our nation is experiencing what many have described as the "American Nightmare." Increasing consumer debt, declines in savings, lower income growth, and a volatile stock market are all a part of our economic insecurity. We have lived in a society that tells us "you deserve it now," whether or not we can afford it or really even need it.

All of us have struggled with these issues. They are important ones that we cannot ignore. This is why, over these 6-weeks, we will have a church-wide study and worship emphasis upon the topic. During this time we will explore what the Bible teaches about financial management. We will do so through worship and small group study on Wednesday night at 6:30. We'll hear advice and stories of what others have learned and we will provide you with some practical tools to assess your situation and to develop a financial plan with a biblical foundation.

At the conclusion of the emphasis, we will have the opportunity to make personal commitments of our offerings to God through our church in 2012. We will consecrate these commitments in the worship service on Nov. 13 and 20th. I hope you will join us in the coming weeks as we look at how we can manage our financial resources and truly experience simplicity, generosity, and joy.

FYI – SOME INTERESTING History - Methodist origins – Continued from last month:

Predecessors The first official organization in the United States occurred in Baltimore, Maryland, in 1784 with the formation of the Methodist Episcopal Church at the Christmas Conference with Francis Asbury and Thomas Coke as the leaders.

Though John Wesley originally wanted the Methodists to stay within the Church of England, the American Revolution decisively separated the Methodists in the American colonies from the life and sacraments of its English counterpart. In 1784, after unsuccessful attempts to have the Church of England send a bishop to start a new church in the colonies, Wesley decisively appointed fellow priest Thomas Coke as superintendent (bishop) to organize a separate Methodist Society. Together with Coke, Wesley sent a revision of the Anglican Prayerbook and the Articles of Religion which were received by the Baltimore Christmas Conference of 1784, officially establishing the Methodist Episcopal Church. The conference was held at the Lovely Lane Methodist Church, considered the Mother Church of American Methodism. John Wesley did not approve of the actions of the American Society; he would continue to be in correspondence with various people about his objections.

The new church grew rapidly in the young country as it employed circuit riders, many of whom were laymen, to travel the mostly rural nation by horseback to preach the Gospel and to establish churches until there was scarcely any village in the United States without a Methodist presence. With 4000 circuit riders by 1844, the Methodist Episcopal Church rapidly became the largest Protestant denomination in the country.

In the more than 220 years since 1784, Methodism in the United States, like many other Protestant denominations, has seen a number of divisions and mergers. In 1830, the Methodist Protestant Church split from the Methodist Episcopal Church over the issue of laity having a voice and vote in the administration of the church, insisting that clergy should not be the only ones to have any determination in how the church was to be operated. In 1844, the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church split into two conferences because of tensions over slavery and the power of bishops in the denomination.

The two general conferences, Methodist Episcopal Church (the northern section) and Methodist Episcopal Church, South remained separate until 1939. That year, the northern and southern Methodist Episcopal Churches and the Methodist Protestant Church merged to create The Methodist Church. The uniting conference took place at First Methodist Church (now First United Methodist Church) of Marion, Indiana.

Some Famous Methodists:

Will Rogers, Fred Gwynne (Herman Munster), James Arness (Matt Dillon), Presidents Polk, Grant, Hayes, McKinley and George W. Geronimo—yes the famous Apache Indian leader. Musicians Karen & Richard Carpenter, Dionne Warwick, Roberta Flack, George Beverly Shea, and Ethel Waters. Author, Stephen King. Religious leaders Norman Vincent Peale, and William Booth (founder of the Salvation Army). Activists Harriet Tubman, and Rosa Parks. Sports professionals Jackie Robinson, Bart Starr and Fran Tarkenton. And didn't we know it—Charles M. Schulz (creator of Charlie Brown.)

People who were *not* Methodists:

- Wright Brothers - Orville and Wilbur Wright, inventors of the airplane, were *not* Methodists, but have sometimes been mistakenly claimed as such. Who would have thought?!
